




Native woodlands - The four woodland groups are drawn from remote rural communities, total population of 1270. The woodlands are located along the west coast of Scotland and contain elements of Atlantic temperate rainforest.

Arkaig Community Forest

Loch Arkaig Pine Forest is 1045ha of previously neglected rain forest in Lochaber. It was purchased by the community (pop. 60) from Forest and Land Scotland in 2016. It is now co-managed by the community and Woodland Trust Scotland. Forest restoration is a key objective.

Cormonachan – education, volunteering, outreach, arts and rural skills training

Cormonachan Community Woodlands Ltd

Cormonachan Woodlands in Argyll and Bute has had community involvement in woodland management since 1998. In 2021 the community (pop. 400) under Cormonachan Community Woodlands Ltd, signed a formal lease agreement with Forest and Land Scotland (FLS). The 63.9ha wood is being restored by volunteers for access and conservation. Their local partners Ardroy Outdoor Education Centre hosts over 1,000 school children every year. Friends of Glenan Wood

Knoydart — firewood sales, timber processing, wooden craft production, venison sales, native woodland creation and contracting

Knoydart Forest Trust

Knoydart Foundation led a community buyout (pop. 110) of a private estate in 1999 including1,095ha of woodland. Knoydart Forest Trust was set up in 1999 to manage the woodland on behalf of Knoydart Foundation. The focus is on jobs, adding value to timber and creating native woods.





Communities and economy

- 4 groups in the study manage a combined area of some **2,323hectares (ha)** and have, over the last three years, a combined income of approximately £1 million. Land under management and 24.7 FTEs equate to approximately **1 FTE for every 94 hectares managed**.
- And from the CWA member survey, we learned that some 52% of responding groups had no staff, 12% had 4 staff (per organisation) and 6% had 3 staff (per organisation). Outliers include one group reporting 13 staff with another of 9 staff (plus2/3 seasonal staff). Some groups indicated a mix of employees and self-employed (contracted) staff.
- + And from the CWA members survey we calculated an average CWA managed area of land to be some 249hectraes in extent, giving us an extrapolated total of **39,840 ha under CWA member management**.
- + CWA membership roll includes 160 groups and from membership returns we know that 51 of these groups are small, 68 are medium sized and 41 are large. Applying the staffing averages from the membership returns we can extrapolate a CWA group membership employment figure, giving a total of 257 posts. 1 CWA group member of staff for every 155ha of woodland managed.
- + Forestry and Land Scotland (FLS) in 2022 report a staff complement of 900, managing 6,400 square kilometres of our forests, meaning that FLS have 1 staff post for every 711 ha under their management.
